The Indian Health Service Center at Stewart has the responsibility for helping the students maintain good physical, mental and dental health—a job that can only be done with student cooperation.

Care is provided through contracted arrangements with local medical resources such as Carson-Tahoe Hospital, as well as through the efforts of IHS physicians from Schurz Indian Hospital and the IHS staff stationed

at the Stewart facility.

At the Homecoming dance, special awards were presented to the football captains.






The 1976-77 Varsity football team had its strongest showing in four years. This year's team was in most all of the conference games until the final whistle.

## *Get Initiated Every Year*









## ***Stewart Undefeated in Meet Competition***









# *His Grasp—or What's a Heaven For?*

George Moran, Teacher-Supervisor for Vocational Shops as well as the school ranch, retired Jan. 1, 1977, after serving in various capacities at Stewart Indian School for 19 years. It was Moran who doggedly insisted the cattle herd should remain at the school ranch when at other BIA schools, farm animals were sold and liquidated.

This herd, numbering from 300-400 animals, is cared for daily by students who ride a bus to the ranch and work for three periods at a stretch...branding, dehorning, castrating, putting up hay, clearing land, plowing, and learning how to erect fences and operate heavy equipment. Three other employees--Harold Hill, Roger Sam, and Leonard Allen, see that life at the ranch goes on daily. Sam is the cowboy, Hill is the heavy equipment operator, and Hill is the agriculture mechanic and pinch hitter when anybody is not there to do their regular job. Hill lives in the ranch house.

# *Cooking Class Dishes it Out*

The morning class in foods service helps to prepare the noon meal and cut garnishes for stews, chop suey, and any other entrees needed for the night meal.

The afternoon class assists in preparing the night meal. They learn to use equipment in the kitchen as well as the proper care and cleanliness of food service procedures. The boys all learn to use the meat saw.

All steaks for swiss steak and spareribs are generally cut by the morning class. Students usually cover six chapters in the text on food preparation. They also learn to use some of the 700 recipes in the text including tartar sauce for fish. Most students who have taken two years of food service can be placed to work in this area upon graduation.






