


Fifteen Wrestlers Made an Impressive




Freshmen Live in East Wing at Nunez;

Pearl Sammaripa always has an exciting 4-H club for the boys she assists with buttons, patches, good manners, and how to keep well groomed.



Math Skills and Science Experiments

Two years of math and one year of science are required to graduate from Stewart Indian School. Ralph Hart and Pat Dekoekkoek are the math teachers and Irene Kurihara and Douglas Colbert are the science teachers.

Hart is the author of a series of booklets known as the 20 Basic Math Skills. These are taught in the first year of math. Mrs. Dekoekkoek teaches algebra and advanced math.

Miss Kurihara teaches biology or life science and Colbert teaches general science which includes some physical science.



Prepare Young Adults to Grasp Fundamentals

The science room was moved back to its old location this year by Mr. Colbert after a building was provided for the art teacher who had used the science room for art classes for one year.

From time to time, buildings get condemned at Stewart because they were built before the new standards for earthquakes were put in force. It is for this reason that classes move from one location to another, as a temporary measure until a new permanent room can be provided.



Four Years of Language Arts

Mrs. Waldine Tyler teaches freshman English. She was assisted the first semester by Mrs. Brenda Leaper, substitute teacher, and the second semester by Eleanor Key, a new English teacher.

Freshmen get a lot of fundamental skills including reading, listening, writing, spelling and talking.

Mrs. Eddie Rucker, extreme left, is the sophomore English teacher. This year, her students were introduced to the Reading Tactics series of books, and they learned about composition and creative writing. Students kept a daily journal of their feelings and jotted happenings in a notebook.



Are Required of All Students

In addition to skills developed in the reading tactics series, American literature was emphasized in junior English taught by Ms. Ruby Shannon and others. Students read plays in class and from movies about their culture, they wrote themes and poems. The best were published in WARPATH at Christmas time.

Senior English, taught by Bernard LeClair emphasized skills in composition and vocabulary building. The classes also studied the American Novel and the short story as a literary form.

In addition, they learned about mythology, poetry, folklore, literature of the American Indian, and improved their spelling.



Trades-Vocational Department Helps Students

The Trades-Vocational Department got a new department head this year. His name is Loren Joseph, and he was promoted from his position as metal shop teacher.

The Vocational Department enabled students to become interested and self-conscious of their work areas while they planned their careers.

The Department consists of carpentry, painting, drafting, heavy equipment, and agriculture. Juniors and seniors worked one-half day periods at the school ranch in Jacks Valley, caring for the herd of cattle, plus doing irrigation and feeding chores.



Plan their Future Career Goals

The business teachers of typing, bookkeeping, and shorthand were recently added to the vocational department. Students learned the basic skills of how to measure a board, begin a blue print, weld a pipe, or repair their heavy equipment. Gerry Emm, agriculture teacher, was especially interested in rodeos, and he sponsored a rodeo club and also planned and sponsored a rodeo on Indian Festival day. Three Years of Social Studies


Human Relations is a social studies class that is required of all students during their senior year. They study first aid, personality (where they learn why their emotions and feelings are the way they are), family life, sex education, and consumer education. Because seniors are involved in this class, they conduct most of their class business here. This class is taught by Lorri Lippy as well as geography, which is a freshman elective course. Every student at Stewart goes through the social studies department before he or she can graduate.



Prepare Students to Meet the World

Title I Keeps Other Classrooms

The Title I program has been at Stewart Indian School for many years. It is also known as the ESEA (ELEMENTARY-SECONDARY EDUCATION ACT) program. Funds provided through ESEA are used to supplement the regular school program by providing remedial reading, remedial math, and remedial English to those students who qualify.

This makes it possible to reduce the pupil-teacher ratio by getting more classroom teachers and educational aides (teacher assistants) to work with students.

The Title I program this year is composed of two reading teachers—Isabelle Yellowhair and Kraig Felt; two individualized teachers—Carol Smith and Courtney Cowley; and two math teachers—Harry Wright and Judy Miller.

In addition, there are positions open for four teaching assistants, but only two have been filled. They are Rose Kizer in the reading center and Gwen Morsette in the math center. Ninety students are in the reading center; 190 are in the math center; and 60 are in the individualized center.
