Entertainers came from California as well as from Arizona and local areas in Nevada.




The math department at Stewart functions for the most part as an individualized program—giving students the basic life skills in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.

Stewart's Band Provides Pep,



Science classes studied the living world this year. After Doug Colbert transferred to the math department, the physical science room remained vacant. Some time was spent gathering chemistry information and examining the metric system.



All by Herself this Year

Use and care of the microscope led to an intensive study of cells and their structure. This continued on into the study of tissues, organs, the organ systems, and the various processes necessary for life to continue. Foods, nutrition, and photosynthesis were also studied.

Environmental studies helped put organisms in their place and showed the interrelations among them and their physical environment. The importance of the physical environment to all organisms was stressed. Last, the human body was investigated. Its structure, operation and maintenance was studied in detail.





The course of Drivers' Education and Drivers' Training is designed to help the student develop good driving attitudes of the road; and to enable them to learn the rules of the road.

Films on safety are shown frequently to the students, and they have speakers from the Nevada State Highway Department visit their classes.

School Cattle Ranch Takes Students

Stewart's school ranch is located about six miles off the main campus in a community called Jack's Valley Juniors, seniors, and a few sophomores are transported daily for two to three hour periods to learn about ranching, operation of heavy equipment, and field laboratory work. Sick animals are cared for fences are repaired, and the animals are fed daily.













Stewart's teams went undefeated in meet competition against strong opponents from Nevada, California, Utah, and Oregon. Boxing was one sport where individuals could win.


by the Model Mental Health Program

Directed by Dr Carl Cooley, psychologist, the staff also included Michael F Hendricks, psychiatric social worker; Georgie Estes, secretary; James L. Glon, Supervisory Recreation Specialist; Kathy R. Murphy, Therapeutic Recreation Specialist, Adrian Z. Bankowski, Therapeutic Recreation Specialist and also Travis Benoist, Therapeutic Recreation Specialist.

Students were given psychological tests; they were counseled, and they were introduced to new and exciting recreations ranging from disco dancing to innertubing in the High Sierras.

Other involvement included tutorial services and a viable awareness/crisis intervention center with peer counselors assisting the staff with specific student needs and problems.
