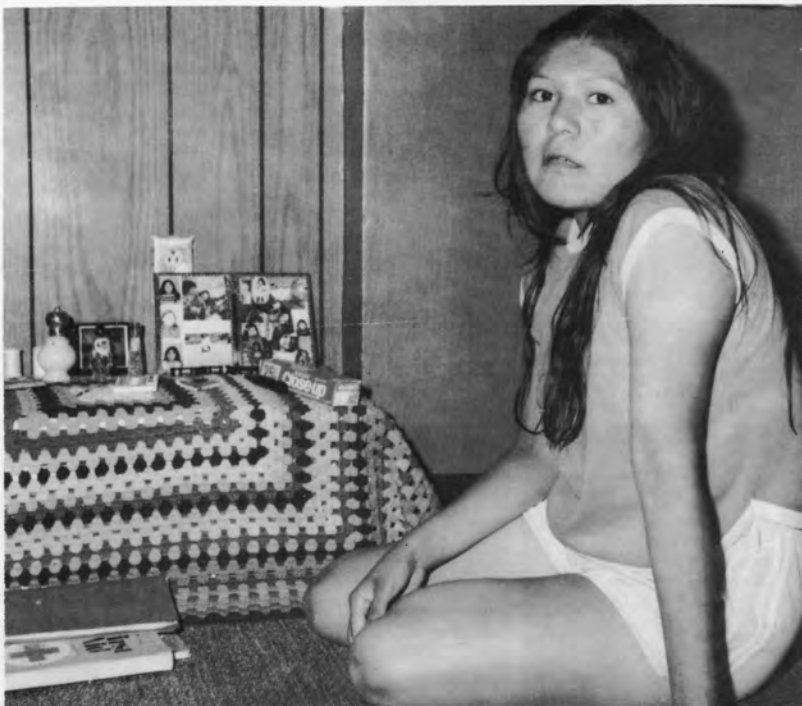

This year, a special slide presentation of Apache Indian dancers was presented by Delmar Boney, a Mescalero Apache from Arizona. Boney explained how his tribe became a tribe, and he had slides of some of its famed leaders, notably Geronimo.

The Stewart Apache Mountain Spirit Dancers began the performances, and this was followed by the Hopi club dancers from Stewart. Some individuals from the Hualapai tribe also did some special dances.

American Indian Day celebration took up one-half day and in the afternoon, a football game was held, so students had a day away from the books.

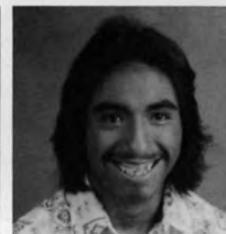

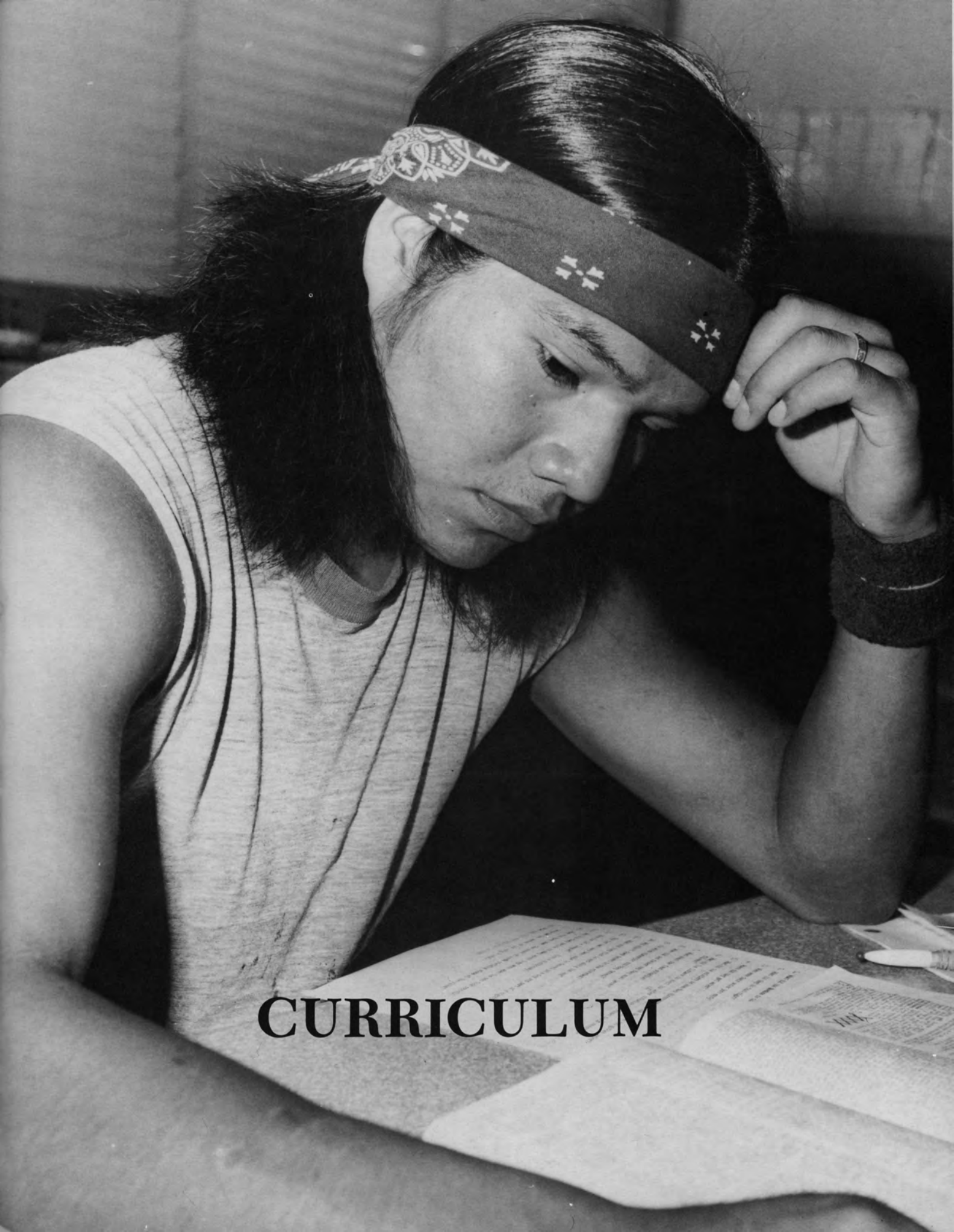
Art Classes Were Filled

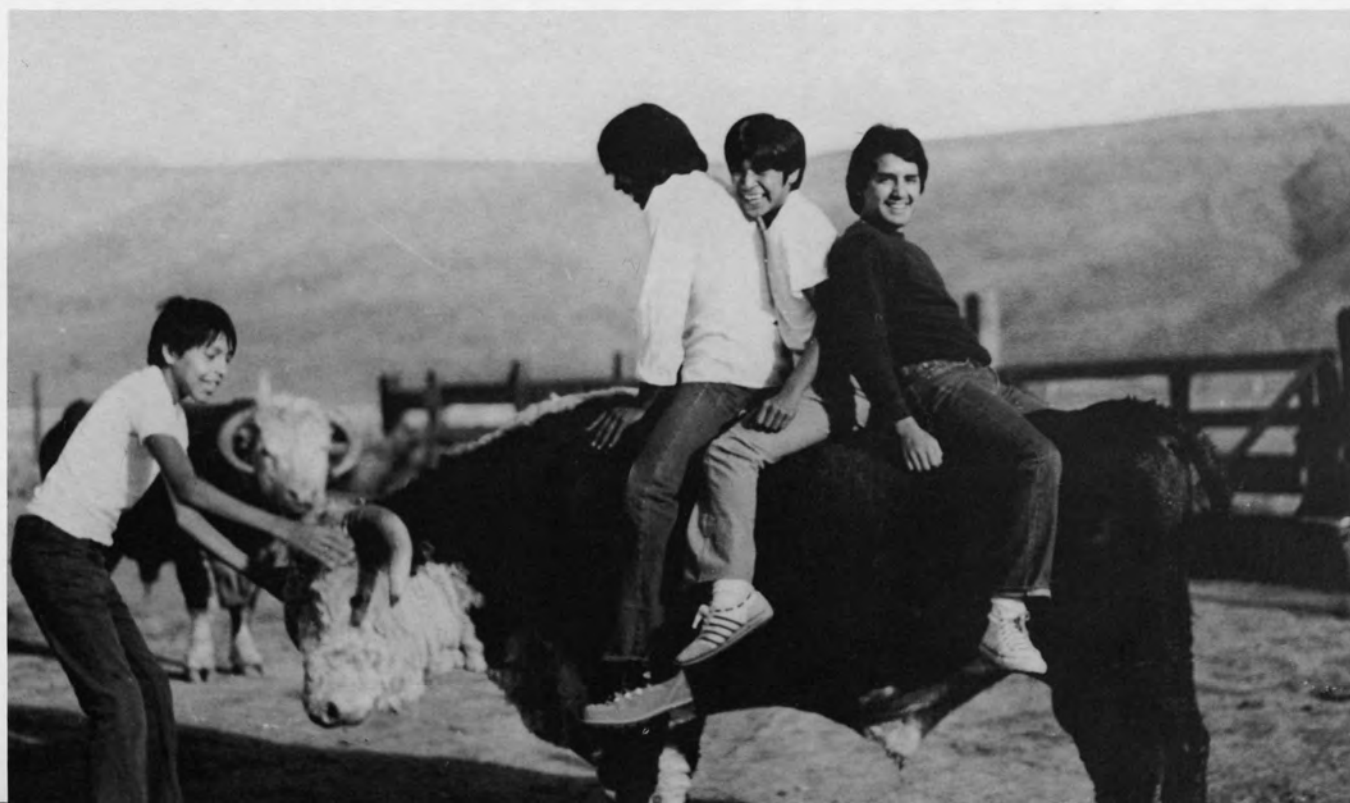

Language Arts, Social Studies



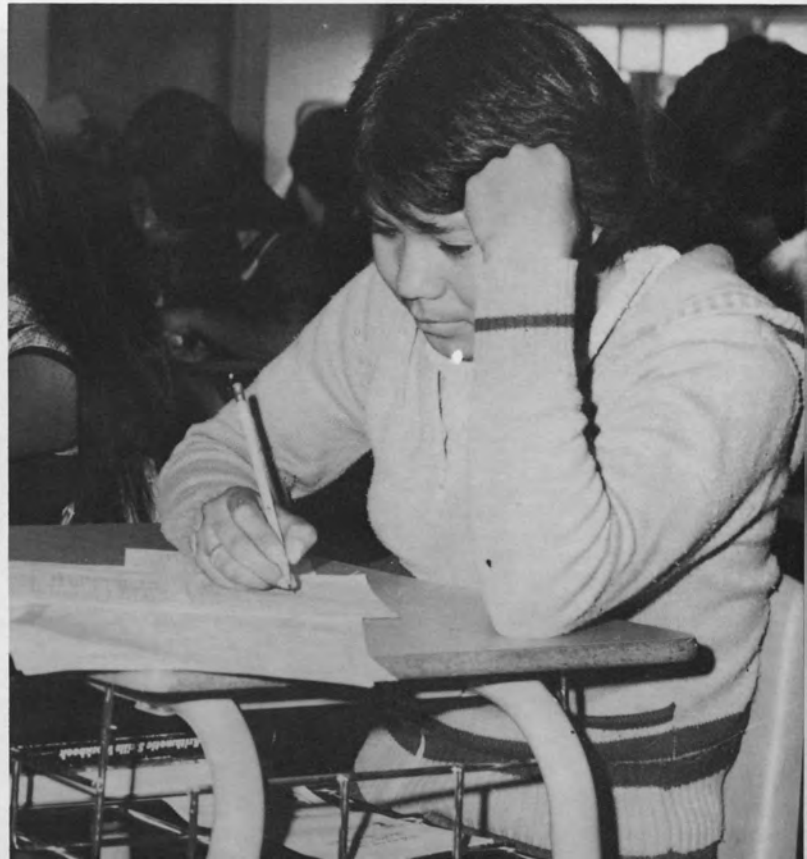

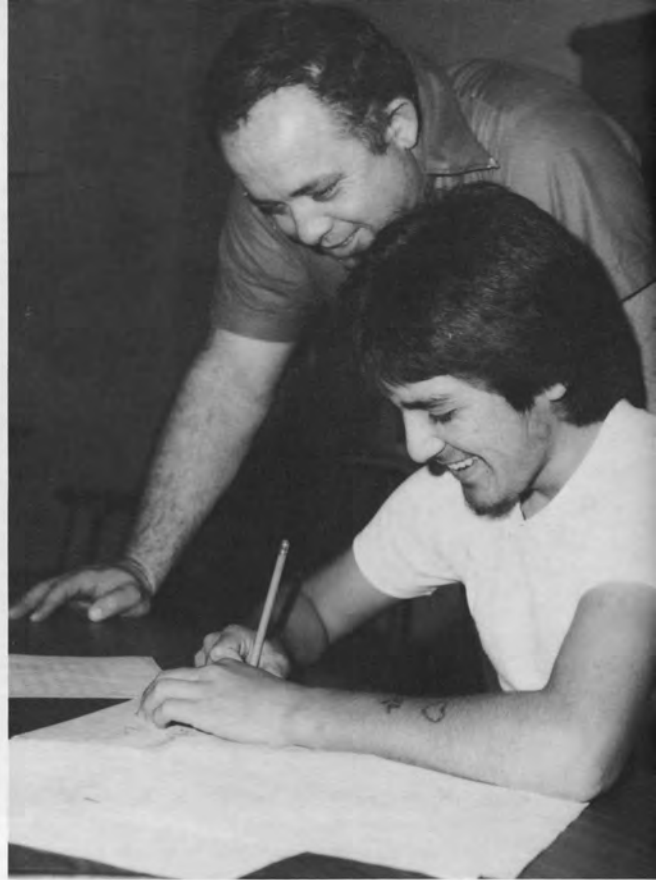
In Maurice Harris's home economics classes, the students sewed much of the time, making garments for themselves, or stuffed animals, yarn animals, pillows, and quilts.

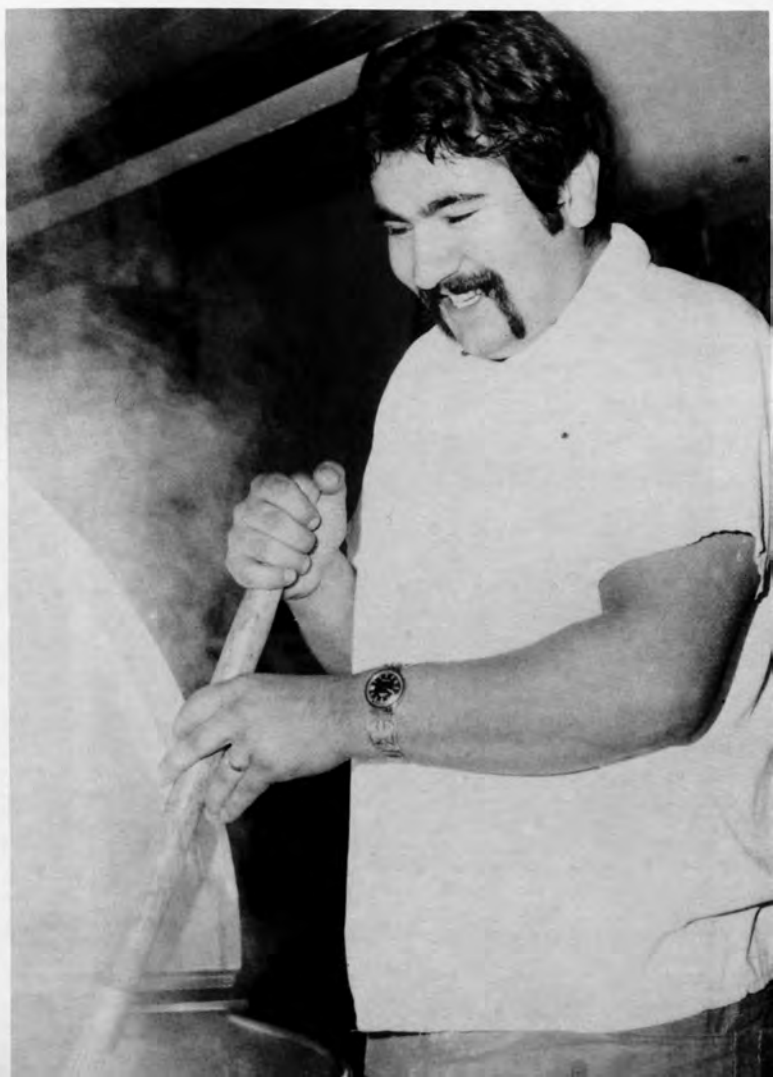


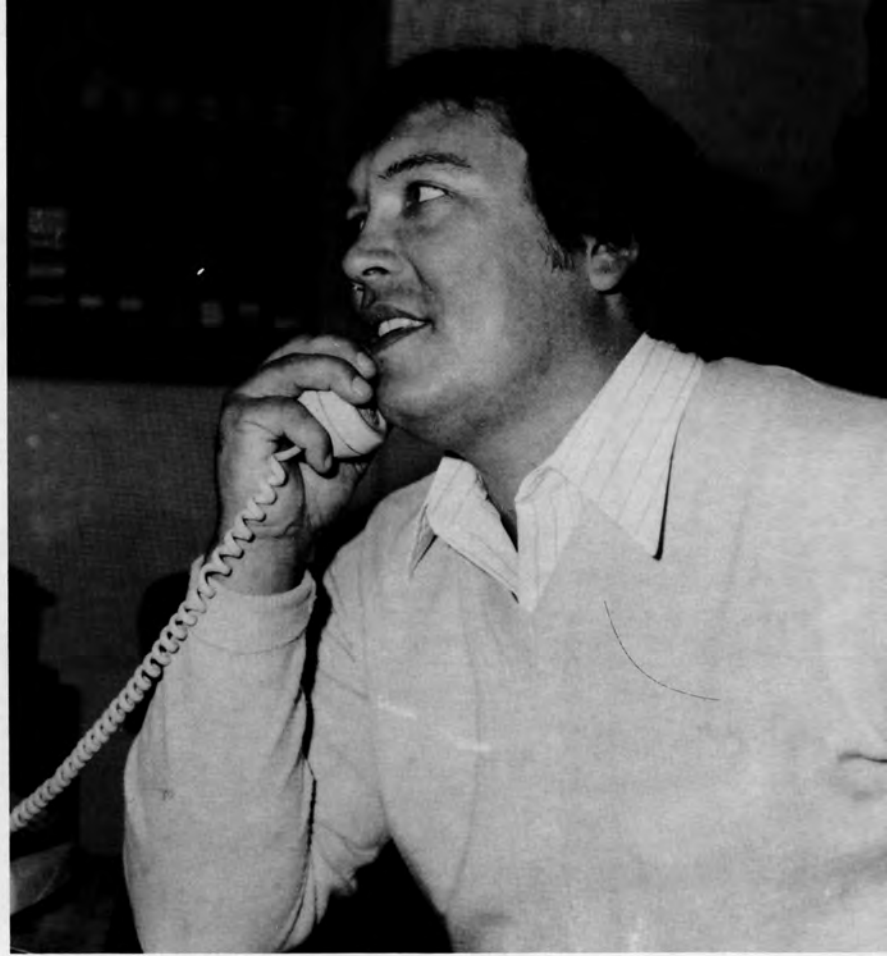
ARA Contracted Food Service
