






The Vocational Shop Division is composed of students taking courses in Auto Mechanics, Plumbing, Painting, Shoe Repairing, Carpentry and Arts and Crafts. Courses are given in related mathematics and mechanical drawing. Boys of the eighth, ninth and tenth levels are in the exploratory field and change each quarter to another group. Levels eleven and twelve are given a choice to specialize in shop work with consideration of individual aptitudes in the field chosen.

One goal of the vocational shops is to give the boys an opportunity to become acquainted with tools used in various shops. Another is two years of specialized training. This prepares him for jobs after he finishes school here, or gives him the necessary background to professional trade schools.





Every student has the opportunity to have practical experience on the job in such divisions as: Laundry, Bakery, Kitchen and production sewing.
