

The job above won't be offered to you.


Now a job is a start. It's like opening a door Into rooms where you have never ventured before.


The work of the Student Council is to solve the problems of some of the things that affect the school and to improve the school in different ways. They also make out the school activities for each month.

.....NEWS FROM THE HOSPITAL....

The Agency Hospital is preparing for the Christmas Season with many new faces in evidence at this institution. For the past few months we have had the services of former Indian Service Nurses who had retired, but in this emergency have returned to their old work. Among these patrioticcally inspired women we have Mrs. Carpenter, Mrs. Talas, and Mrs. O'Harra. For a time, we were without a Head Nurse, since Miss Lucas had left for Tacoma, Wahington; but Mrs. Carpenter volunteered to assume the duties of Acting Head Nurse and did a fine job.

Within the past week, however, our new Head Nurse has arrived. She is Miss Minnie Mae Hunter, who has had many years experience in the Indian Service, having been in Minnesota, New Mexico, and California before coming here. She is a very pleasant, competent person, actively interested in rendering service to our sick at the Agency Hospital. We have been ably assisted also be the services of Miss Cora A. Brouillet, Chief Nurse at Large, who was very generously sent to us by the Chicago Office to help out during the shortage of personnel and to arrange for the indoctrination of the Nurses in the hew Hospital Manual. Through her advice and suggestions, the standards in our hospital will be raised, and compare most favorably with the other hospitals in and out of the Indian Service.

It has been definitely determined to stop calling the Agency Hospital the Sanatorium and to give it its proper name--"The Agency Hospital"--or as preferred the "General Hospital".

It will be of interest to the students at the School to learn about the new regulations concerning visiting at the Agency Hospital. Visiting hours are now set up from 3 to 4 PM and from 6:30 to 7:30 PM. However, no children under sixteen will be permitted to visit in the hospital except by special persomission of the Hoad Nurse or the Nurse in Charge. This step is taken in the interest of the school children in order to prevent spreading communicable and other diseases, since many such cases are constantly being treated at the Agency Hospital. Visiting by the school children at this hospital might tend to spread contagious diseases all over the campus.

We were honored by the visit of the Director of Nursing, 'Miss Sallie Jeffries, on November 30, 1943. Miss Jeffries was accompanied by Dr. D. J. Hunt, District Medical Director, with whom she inspected the various hospital institutions. She expressed keen interest in our program and left encouraging notes among the Health Personnel. We were sorry that she was unable to spend a longer period with us but pressing duties forced her to continue her journey the next day.


The following letter was received at the school office from one of our former students. We certainly enjoy hearing from the boys and do wish you would all write to us.


Grade Seven...Continued






