During that time our school enrollment has held up better than for a number of years in the past. During the first quarter of this year, we have had an average daily attendance of 122 students--indeed an outstanding record.

Our boys and girls have been and are making many other fine records. Boys and girls who are graduates of Carson Boarding School are doing real jobs in everyday life. Over forty recent graduates and former students of the Carson Boarding School are in the United States Military Service at the present time.

The boys and girls are cooperating in every way possible to conserve food, clothing, equipment, light and utilities. Above all you boys and girls have demonstrated that you can and will, in case of necessity and emergency, do a splendid job, whatever it may be. This has been demonstrated many times--your contributions to the Red Cross, your response to the recent blackouts, your response to fire alarms and drills and the cooperation you give to every occasion. This shows that you are real men and women and can deliver the goods.

Personnel Changes

Agency Office

Mr. William E. Dial, Education Field Agent of the Carson jurisdiction, has been offered the position of principal at Jones Academy in Oklahoma. It will be a nice promotion for Mr. Dial. Although we regret his leaving, we certainly want to congratulate him for doing a fine piece of work that is being recognized by the Indian Service. He started his career in the Indian Service as a teacher in the Carson Boarding School. Many of our boys remember Mr. Dial as a teacher and cottage master in the boys' department.

The promotion has also resulted in a proposed promotion for Mr. E. A. Haglund as a field agent of the Educational Division of the Carson jurisdiction. This likewise is a change which we would hate to see made if we were selfish. He has also done an outstanding piece of work as Assistant Principal; however, we are very happy that he has been offered this promotion. Mr. Haglund started his career as a classroom teacher in the Carson Boarding School. He was made Assistant Principal a little over a year ago. We certainly want to congratulate both of them.

Mr. A. M. Hawley, the Boys' Adviser, has taken over the Assistant Principal's duties temporarily. We feel that his shoulders are broad enough to carry extra responsibilities, while Mr. Haglund is getting acquainted with the field.

Mr. Allen Lovine, who has been at Stewart as Boys' Adviser, teacher and coach for the last year and a half, expects to return to Service in the U.S. Army soon. Mr. Lovine is a graduate of Sherman Institute and holds a Bachelor of Science degree from the San Diego State College, San Diego, California. Before coming to Stewart, Mr. Lovine spent two years in Social Service work in California. He spent several months this summer at Camp Roberts where he finished his basic Army training. Mr. Lovine has done a commendable piece of work at Stewart and every one is sorry to lose him from our staff. We wish him lots of success in his new assignment for Uncle Sam.

Due to the installation of the new accounting system which has been in effect for several months here, it was necessary to transfer various personnel to new locations in the office and assigning them to new duties. Under the new system, all departments (CCC-ID, Roads, Rehab., Construction and Agency) go to the one purchasing department for purchases of any material; payment of all bills and personnel procedures will all be taken in by the cash office, and accounting work for all departments by the accounting office. A new bookkeeping machine will be delivered in the near future and will materially benefit our accounting procedure.

Heavy snow fall the past week has made it practically impossible for most division heads to go into the field.

It is now necessary for all personnel driving government vehicles, due to various economy measures, to fill out a slip for each trip three days prior to travel and submitting same to Miss Harrington, who will act as "Transportation Checker", and will, if possible, see that all trips to the same locations at the same time are combined. The field stations will also follow this same procedure in elimination of travel which procedures are necessary particularly at the present time of National Emergency, economy should be practiced at all times.

Mr. Carney's crew has had to enlarge its office space.

The basement of the office is being fixed up as office space for the CCC-ID, Rehabilitation managers and the Roads and Irrigation Engineers.

Mr. Elwyn Katus is a new member to the office force, working in the cash office. He transferred here from the Agricultural Adjustment Administration in South Dakota.

Our plants froze that cold night. We have some new ones started.

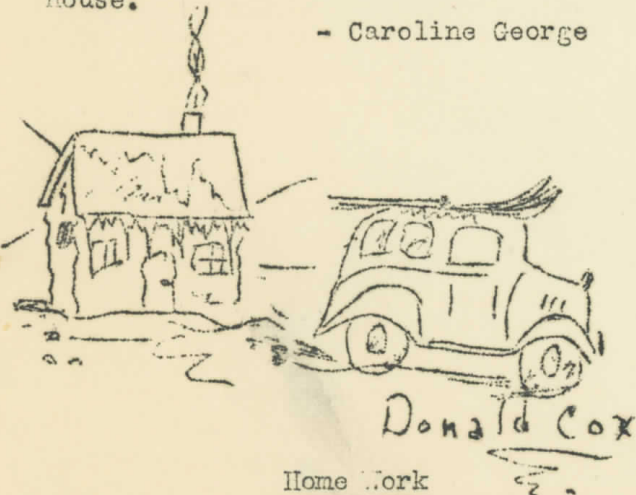
Here are some stories written by two second grade girls:

The snow is going down, and it is soft. It is good to make snowballs. The boys snowball the girls, and the girls snowball the boys, sometimes.

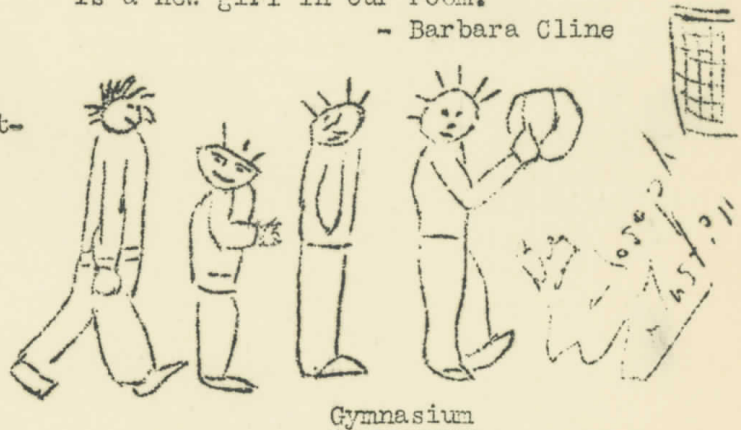

2. Daily at 5:30 P.M. (a) feed 17 lbs. scratch; (b) feed 14 lbs. mash; (c) gather, count, candle, and pack eggs in egg crates.
3. Hospitalize sick or crippled chickens as the need arises.
4. Twice a week we clean the droppings from the roosts and we also clean the water troughs twice each week.
5. During Christmas vacation we gave our hen house a very good cleaning and put three bales of clean straw on the floor. We also made clean nests.

We are learning a lot and we enjoy it very much. Verna liked taking care of chickens so well that she asked to do it all the time, but Miss Galloway suggested that we all take our turns. We sent for poultry bulletins from the University of Nevada, and Mr. Hutchinson has loaned us books for study.

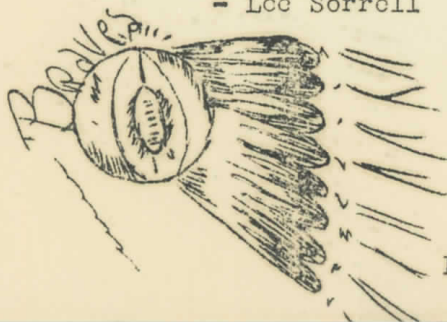
